

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES:

Supply chain management is primarily concerned with the planning, acquisition, conversion, flow, and distribution of goods from raw materials to finished goods. The purchasing department in a typical organization is responsible for securing all necessary raw materials, supplies, capital goods, and services at the best value possible. The supply chain management function coordinates the major activities contributing to materials costs and availability including purchasing, production control, warehousing, and distribution. Approximately 50% of all sales dollars are spent on purchased items or services, and the importance of the purchasing and supply chain management function in an organization cannot be overemphasized. Graduates of the program usually start as buyers, supply chain analysts, buyer/planners, inventory supervisors, or in contract administrator trainee positions. They then move up to a position of:



- senior buyer
- plant manager
- contract administrator
- purchasing manager
- supply chain manager
- top executive positions

CURRICULUM:

The program prepares students to handle broad managerial responsibilities that impact the success of the company and the competitiveness of the entire supply chain. To specialize in supply chain management, students must attain BSBA admission and have a cumulative BGSU GPA of at least a 2.50 before they can be admitted to the program. In addition to BSBA core courses, students take courses in supply management, logistics, quality management, and supply chain and operations planning. Internships and co-ops are strongly encouraged.



SPECIAL HIGHLIGHTS:

- Nearly \$40,000 in department scholarships in 2006
- Over 80% of graduates have had at least 1 co-op or internship in their field.
- Average 2005-06 BGSU co-op hourly wage for production/purchasing students was \$14.50.
- Purchasing students co-op at places such as SAIC, Bendix, GlaxoSmithKline, and Honda.
- The BGSU supply chain management program is recognized as one of the largest and best undergraduate programs in the country.
- The demand for professionals in this area is strong. Most students have jobs in their field within 3 months of graduation.
